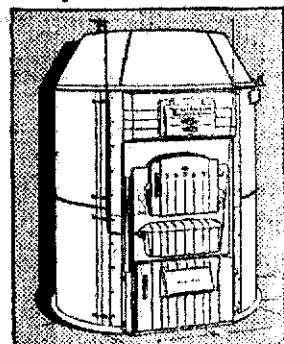

## Six Are Dead From Week End Traffic Mishaps

Indianapolis, Ind., April 14—(INS)—Most victims of fatal traffic accidents in Indiana this week end were youthful.

Nancy Simmons, two months old, and her sister, Norma Simmons, 8, of Otterbein, met death in an automobile collision near Lafayette. A brother, James Simmons, was injured seriously and the parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Simmons, were also hurt.

Lorraine Snyder, 18, of Cedar Lake, died of injuries suffered in a car crash April 9 near Valparaiso. Harold Moser, of Westville, also in the accident, died the next day.

Robert Howard King, 10, of Harrison, was struck and killed by the door handle of a truck near his home when he walked against its side.

William J. Burch, 18, of Vincennes, was injured fatally near that city when he lost control of his automobile which left the road.

Paul Lowman, 35, pilot and Warsaw flying school operator, and his passenger, Carl Wyrick, 24, of Warsaw, were rescued from a Republic Seabee which crashed in Winona Lake. After they had climbed out to the wings of the crashed plane, they were taken off in a speedboat by Homer Hatfield and Lewis Meredith, of Warsaw.

Indianapolis, Ind., Apr. 14—(INS)—The Public Service Commission took under advisement today a petition of the city of Bicknell for permission to issue \$310,000 in water works revenue bonds. At a hearing, five witnesses testified in favor of the petition and none against it.

(Concluded from Page 1) stress the fact that most forest fires can be prevented because nearly 90 per cent of them are man-caused.

Economics has played a decisive role in bringing about this change. Expanding forest industries today provide markets which make tree-growing profitable. Consider this fact alone: In 1872, little more than 2,000 cords of wood were used for paper making in the United States; today more than 16,000,000 cords are used annually for this purpose. In the day when our forests were almost untouched and the uses for wood relatively few, there was little incentive to grow trees. Today, farmers and other small woodlot owners who collectively own nearly 60 per cent of all our commercial forest lands are learning that forest management really pays.

The pioneers of Arbor Day built upon a strong foundation when they selected the future, rather than the past, as their cornerstone. The significance of Arbor Day is greater on its diamond jubilee than it was when it started.

## Alex Dillon Of Otwell Dies At The Age Of 73

OTWELL—Sylvester Alex Dillon, 73, retired carpenter, painter and paper hanger, died at his home here about 3:30 A. M. Sunday. He was forced to discontinue his work about two years ago because of failing health, and had been seriously ill for the past four weeks.

Mr. Dillon was born near Otwell on August 21, 1873, the son of James Dillon and Martha Gilbreath Dillon.

On July 4, 1895, he was married to Miss Phoebe Craig who survives. Of the six children born to the couple, four sons are living. They are Lovell of Doniphan, Mo., and Tony, Mack and Jeff of Otwell.

Two daughters, Mrs. James Barnett and Mrs. Mildred Dillon, preceded him in death, the latter in infancy.

Beside his wife and children he leaves two sisters, Mrs. John Bowers of Nowood, Colo. and Mrs. John Arnold of Washington, Ind.; 14 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

The body will be at the home until Tuesday morning when services will be held in the Methodist Church at Otwell, with the Rev. Claude Hayes officiating. Burial will be in the I.O.O.F. cemetery at Otwell.

food items and inability to replace worn equipment resulted in some permittees dispensing with warm food and confining their food service to cold sandwiches and like items. This does not meet the requirements of the Indiana Alcoholic Beverage law and all permittees must be equipped to at least serve hot soups, hot sandwiches and hot coffee. This is the absolute minimum to be accepted for food service and permittees who are not equipped to serve hot food must at once install the necessary equipment and give hot food service or jeopardize their permits.

## 20 Injured When Jewish Blockade Runner Caught

Jerusalem, April 14—(INS)—About 20 injured Jewish refugees from an intercepted illegal immigrant ship were landed by a British naval vessel today at the north Palestine port of Haifa.

Some of them had bullet wounds received when the 27 hundred Jews on the blockade-runner resisted a British naval boarding party.

They charged that steel-helmeted bluejackets opened fire on them, although none aboard the intercepted vessel was said to have been armed.

Jews who gathered on the shore to meet the ship with the injured immigrants accused British troops and police of using rough tactics while making identity checks.

The intercepted vessel is being towed to Haifa by two British destroyers.

## Critchfield Rites This Afternoon

Funeral services were held at 1 o'clock this afternoon at Wickliffe, in Crawford county, for Shirley James Critchfield. He died suddenly in Indianapolis last Friday at the age of 57. Following his death, the body was brought to the Schmutzler Funeral Home in Huntingburg, where it remained until this morning when it was taken to Wickliffe for the services. Rev. Theresia Hardy officiated at the last rites. Interment will be in Wickliffe cemetery.

He is survived by four brothers, Charles of Indianapolis, Jordan of Frankfort, Michael of Vincennes, and Edward of Wickliffe; two sisters, Mrs. Emma Faust of Vincennes and Mrs. Leora Madley of Eckerty, and a niece of Huntingburg.

## Lindbergh Backs Plan To Aid Greeks, Turks

New York, April 14—(INS)—Charles A. Lindbergh broke his traditional silence today and declared his support of President Truman's proposed aid to Green and Turkey.

The noted flyer reversed his pre-war isolationist stand and said that the "rocket-atomic age" has destroyed America's isolation.

He said America's security now depends on aiding financially and by force if necessary those "peoples who believe in a way of life similar to our own."

He called for a "consistent" America policy toward Europe.
