

DEATH TAKES NO HOLIDAY; TOLL GOES ABOVE 400

CHICAGO, July 5.—The number of deaths in Fourth of July week-end accidents soared past the 400 mark tonight, as millions of fun-loving Americans sped down the nation's highways and jammed beaches and resorts.

The ever-mounting toll rose to 440 dead, with the three-day holiday less than two-thirds over.

Auto Deaths Jump
Auto accident fatalities had jumped to 191. That was fewer than 100 under the National Safety Council's prediction that 275 persons would be injured fatally over the week-end. The number of drownings had mounted to 137.

Many Fireworks Deaths
Ninety-eight persons died in miscellaneous accidents. Seven had been killed in fireworks mishaps—four more than last year.

3 Stowaways Fly to N. Y. From Sweden

NEW YORK, July 5.—(UP)—The story of three young Swedes who made history by becoming the first stowaways on a transatlantic airliner was disclosed today at La Guardia Field.

Oskar Naroski, 19 years old, of Stockholm, told how he and his two companions hid themselves in a baggage compartment of a Scandinavian Airlines plane at Stockholm Airport with six sandwiches and a flashlight and made the 26-hour flight unknown to the plane's crew and passengers.

Naroski said the three separated Thursday morning but were to meet that afternoon in Rockefeller Center.

The Northwest Washington Community Council will be "happy to see the state take over operation of all ferry lines on Puget Sound" if the Puget Sound Navigation Company discontinues its operations because of a battle over ferry routes, John Merckel, Bremerton attorney and director of the council, said last night.

The State Department of Transportation Thursday set new ferry rates at 10 per cent over 1937 rates and Capt. Alex M. Peabody, president of the navigation company, said yesterday the firm will tie up its ferries unless the rate boost is increased.

Forest Fires Won't Be The Same After Bruseth Quits

DARRINGTON, July 5.—If Nels Bruseth really retires from the Forest Service next year, as he says he will, a forest fire in the Darrington district just won't be the same.

But then they aren't the same, anyway, as when Nels started 30 years ago, what with airplanes, smoke-jumpers, walkie-talkies and other modern improvements to fill the gap Nels will leave.

Bruseth is one of those fellows built with no low gear. Not only does he take a straight line as the shortest distance between two points, even if they are two mountain peaks, but he looks upon a dog-trot as the ordinary, leisurely method of getting there.

Outside a few inevitable outward evidences of years, such as gray hair, Nels could be any age. He's old enough to be the father of the men in their 30's, who tell themselves, comfortably, that they are now past their physical prime and might as well relax, but he can out-hike, out-pack and out-work any of the youngsters in his crew of fire wardens and trail workers.

Sharp Eyes Paid Off
In his early days with the Forest Service, Nels was a lookout on Mount Pugh, dozen or more miles up the Sauk River from Darrington. He was sharp-eyed enough as a lookout to spot a young Norwegian girl who was visiting relatives in the town.

Being on a remote mountain was no deterrent to Nels. In the evening he came galloping down from the peak to go a-courting, and during the night hours he trudged up the rocks to the top again, to be on duty at daylight.

Nels bellies the journey because, as he says, "it wasn't so far the way I came. I didn't use the trail. I followed the mountain-goat paths."

The hikes were successful, and the couple was married. Now he and Mrs. Bruseth have a couple of very pretty daughters. One is married and lives in Seattle; the other, Betty, is a senior at Darrington High School.

Many Titles, One Meaning
The Mount Pugh journeys took place more than 25 years ago, but when it comes to traveling, Nels hasn't slowed down. One 20-year-old, who had worked in the Forest Service last year, commented, "Did you ever follow that guy through the brush? What an experience!"

The rangers come college-trained in forestry, and Nels knows personally every rock and tree in the huge district, so between them they have a highly successful working arrangement.

Now Nels is on the home stretch. A year from now he can retire. But unlike most active men who dread the event, Nels is looking forward to it.

That's because Nels is such a busy man outside of his job, and his job sometimes interferes with the time he'd like to spend on his painting, botany and geological studies, newspaper correspondence for The Arlington Times, local history research, music, color photography, work on the home place, Darrington civic affairs and tramping in the mountains just for the fun of it.

ALASKA FORESTS GO UNPROTECTED

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Forests of the Kenai Peninsula, where fires have burned over more than 90,000 acres since June 7, and other territorial forests outside the Douglas fir stands in the rain belt of Southeastern Alaska will go unprotected this year, Alaska Delegate E. L. Bartlett reported today.

The rich stands of timber in Southeastern Alaska are under the control of the United States Forest Service, in the Agriculture Department, and Congress has appropriated money to protect them.

Northern Alaskan forests, however, are under the supervision of the Interior Department's Bureau of Land Management, since they are part of the public domain.

Last year \$170,000 was allowed for fighting forest fires in the public domain of both continental United States and Alaska. This amount enabled allocation of 40 fire-fighters to Northern Alaska. These men were dismissed Monday, last day of the government's fiscal year.

Interior Department appropriation committee members of both House and Senate stated that, in an area as vast as Northern Alaska, 40 men were "only a drop in the bucket and could do no good."

When passed, this year's appropriations will include no provision for fire-fighters in the public domain of Alaska—and only \$40,000 for the public domain of the continental United States.
